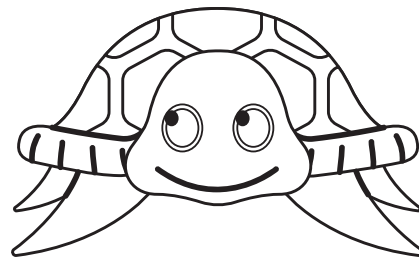
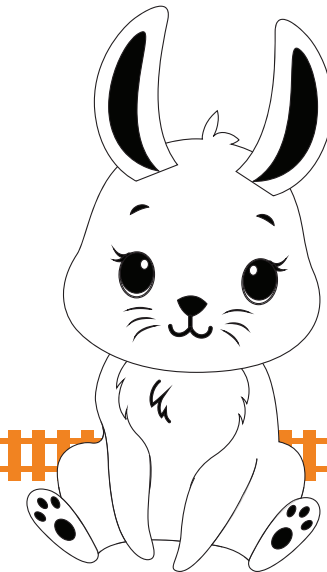
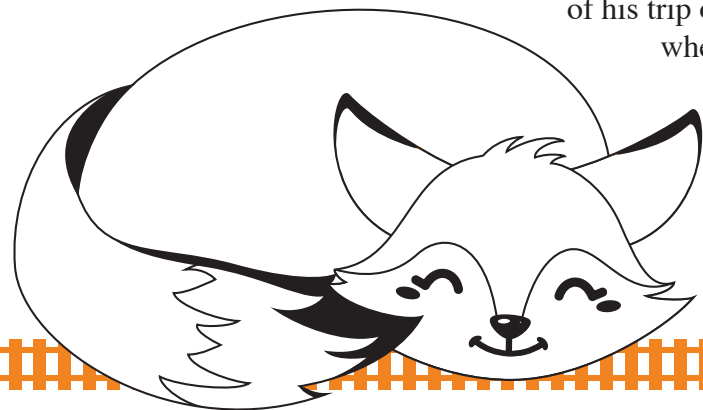


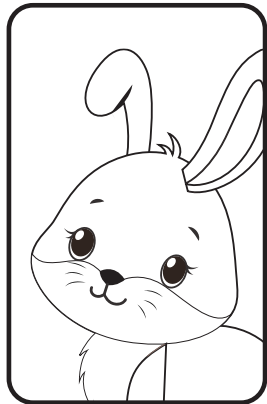
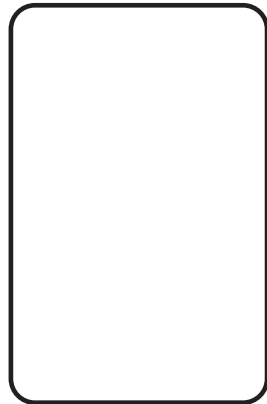
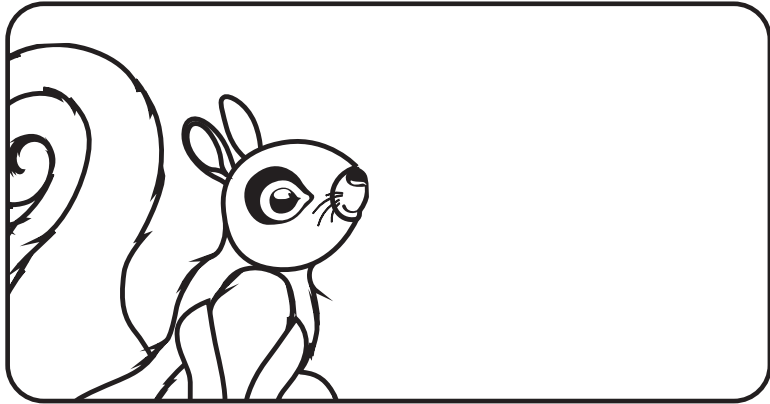
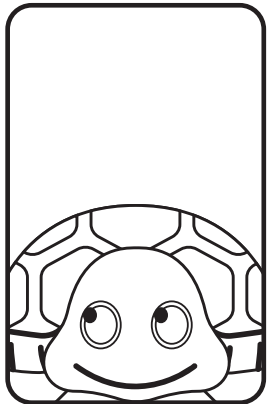
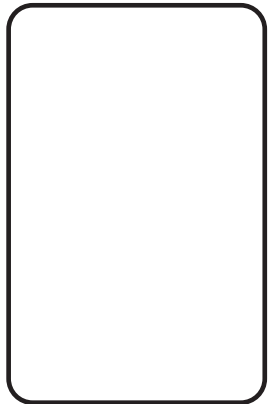
Later that night...

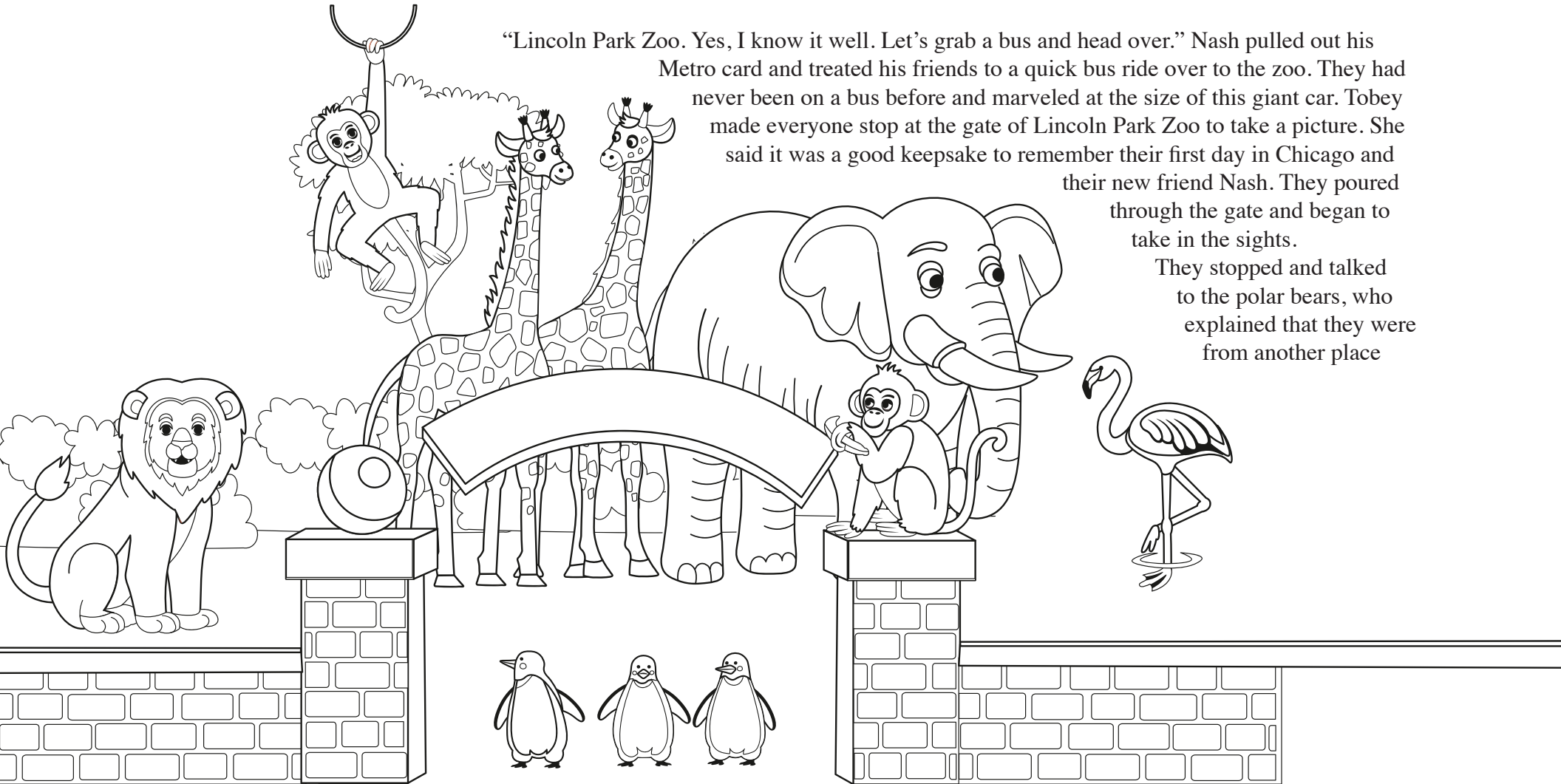
